STUDENTS LEARN THE "WRITE" WAY TO CRAFT





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CRIMEA & UKRAINE: RUSSIA'S PLAY TOYS

Living in the battle-torn grounds of Crimea where multiple protesters have been killed, around 2000 detained from both sides, and roughly 3000 lives lost so far make the country borderline unlivable and "temporarily occupied" by Russia.

Many battles and events have led to the unrest in both countries of Russia and Ukraine; most of this comes from the supposed annexation of Crimea from Ukraine, while other smaller events slowly tore liberty and loyalty from the citizens of Ukraine, specifically Crimea.

Refusal of European Union Agreement - On November 21, 2013, former Ukrainian President Viktor Yanukovych refused to sign a European Union Agreement which sparked a movement called "Euromaidan." Euromaidan called for the acceptance into the agreement and the removal of President Yanukovych. This result ultimately came into action when President Yanukovych was removed in February of 2013.

Ukraine separatists - On the other side of the spectrum, citizens of Crimea were mainly in support of gaining ties with Russia and allowing Russia to annex them into the Russian Federation. These opposing views and unrest led to the 2014 Crimean Crisis.

Russia Involvement-Russia, including leader Vladimir Putin, initially declined all involvement in the conflict despite their willingness to

annex the Crimean Peninsula into the Russian Ferderation. However, after rebel battles with Ukrainian troops intensified, many eyewitnesses have identified unmarked Russian military weapons, vehicles, and other militant supplies.

Rebel battles - Pro-Russian rebels of locality and of Russian roots are both battling for "...the liberation of all Russian lands" and are ready to "...march all the way to the Danube" as one rebel field commander Alexander Matyushin was quoted saying.

After the English hostage named Alan Henning was beheaded on film on October 10, another hostage named Peter Kassig has been beheaded and became the new victim of the ISIS massacre. Already, five western humanitarian beneficiaries have been beheaded by ISIS.

On November 16, the terroristic organization, ISIS, issued a new video on the internet to claim that they beheaded Peter Kassig, an American humanitarian beneficiary. In the video, an executioner had been called Jihadi John, pointed at Peter's head on the ground.

Peter Kassig was a 26-year old from Indiana who started a nonprofit organization called Special **Emergency Response and Assistance** (SERA). He was also a veteran of the Iraq war who was living in Beirut working to provide relief for refugees. On October, 1, 2013, he was kidnapped by ISIS. Unfortunately, even though his family tried to rescue him, he was killed by ISIS.

In the video, there were also at least 18 Syrian soldiers that had been beheaded. The militants forced those captives to kneel on the ground before beheading them. Those people who were killed by ISIS were not the only victims. The United Nations claimed, ISIS militants killed and wounded more than 24,000 Iraqi and Syrian civilians. They beheaded, buried, shot, or hanged those innocent civilians. They also raped and murdered a number of women. Then, they kidnapped the women

and forced them to be slaves or sold. Especially, they focused on Yazidis and other "giaours." Giaours is an offensive religious and sometimes ethnic slur used by Muslims in Turkey and the Balkans to describe all who are non-Muslim. The term is considered highly offensive by Christians in the Balkans. ISIS has tried to kill anyone who holds a different thought than them.

Meanwhile, ISIS called for the Islamic militants in the world to join with them. Since they released the videos on September 21, several national governments in the world discovered and arrested hundreds of "volunteers" who planned to join into ISIS. And they also trained the children to prepare the war against any position.

Even though there's a current massacre in Iraq and Syria, most LHS students still think that ISIS is just a terrorist organization like al-Qaeda. In response to a question about the popularity of ISIS, Mr. Young, a government teacher at Landstown High School, replied, "I would say some students do know, and some students don't. They would know from the media but miss some information." So, could an ISIS massacre eventually become a new "Rwanda Massacre"? Would people then become totally familiar with ISIS?

John Kerry, the US Secretary of State, expressed that global anti-ISIS actions have already made some positive results, and the allied nations will continue to strike ISIS.

"Still, we continue to face a terrorist threat. We cannot erase every trace of evil from the world, and small groups of killers have the capacity to do great harm. That was the case before 9/11, and that remains true today. That's why we must remain vigilant as threats emerge."

DEATH WITH DIGNITY

Assisted suicide, otherwise known as euthanasia, has become quite a controversial topic in the past month due to Brittnay Maynard. Maynard, a 29-year old woman was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer. She made the controversial decision to end her life on her own terms on November 1, 2014, just two days after her husband's birthday.

After being diagnosed in January of 2014, she was told she had approximately six months to live. She packed up her bags and moved to Oregon where she was legally allowed to medically kill herself. She decided to go to this extreme because she was suffering from, "increasingly frequent and longer seizures, severe head and neck pain, and stroke-like symptoms," stated Sean Crowley, a Compassion and Choices spokesperson. Although many people have criticized her on her drastic decision, she spoke out herself stating, "I'm not killing myself. Cancer is killing me," in order to justify what she was doing.

Euthanasia is not widely agreed upon; in fact only four states allow assisted suicide and thirty-nine have laws prohibiting it. There is also

physician-assisted suicide, in which the doctor performs the act. In euthanasia, the physician provides the necessary means and/or information, but the patient performs the act.

Request to end life to reduce suffering through both physician assisted suicide and euthanasia has taken place in the medical field since its existence began. In fact, a recent study shows 57% of physicians have been asked to participate in one way or another. At less than \$300, assisted suicide is considered to be the cheapest form of treatment when it comes to terminal illness.

Secobarbital is the medication that most physicians prescribe for assisted suicide next to pentobarbital. For secobarbital, the dose that is prescribed is normally 9 grams in capsules or if you are prescribed pentobarbital, the dose is 10 grams of the liquid, and it is typically mixed with something else in order to taste better.

Although it may be a last resort for some and seen as they have given up the fight, it is helping people like Brittnay Maynard end their lives on their own terms.in capsules or if



Starbucks has 21,000 stores in over 65 counties. The first Starbucks opened in 1971 in Seattle, WA.




Latte is Espresso, steamed milk, and flavors of caramelized chestnuts and spices. Topped with whipped cream and spiced praline crumbs.

DONT BE A STATISTIC, KNOW THE FACTS **ABOUT DATE RAPE**

Being a teenager is all about having fun and living life to the fullest. But it also comes with many responsibilities. What people don't realize is that date rape is a huge dilemma that people should be aware of.

Rohypnol, known as "roofies," is one of the most common forms of date rape drugs. But what do we really know about it? Rohypnol has many of the same qualities as Valium (another sedative drug), but is approximately ten times more potent then Valium. Even though Rohypnol is not sold in the U.S, it is sold in 64 countries around the world. When taken alone, and for the right reasons, it's like any other sleeping medication. But when taken with alcohol and for horrific reasons, it can be deadly.

Date rape can happen to anyone, anywhere, at any time. "Roofies" are colorless, tasteless, odorless, and dissolve rapidly in drinks. At first glance you wouldn't be able to tell whether the drug has been dropped into your drink. The effects begin to hit the victim within ten minutes and will actually erase most, or all,

the memories of the incident. Alysha Jackson, a 22 year old senior at Clark Atlanta University, admitted "being in a college environment is definitely a lot scarier because you're on your own a lot." According to the UScience, one in every four college women have been date raped or have experienced an attempt.

Many say that men are to blame. And it's slightly true because, according to the Narcotic Educational Foundation of America, the two most common groups are young adult males preying on victims and high school students who use it recreationally. But anyone can be a user and those are the only ones to blame. Gender does not matter at all. In fact, in the U.S, about 10% of victims are males. "I think it happens to women more but could happen to anyone. Many people are vulnerable because of how easy it is to be drugged," expressed Aiden Klaers, Landstown High School senior.

Most people don't worry about staying safe 24/7. Stay at home

mom of LHS student, Doris Hernandez, thinks, "When it comes to being safe, younger women are very careless." With something as serious as this, everyone should be extremely cautious, no matter the age or gender. Sherry Constantine, a 21 year old former Virginia Wesleyan student advises, "Know your surroundings. Don't accept drinks from anyone, even water. Have a buddy check up on you throughout the night. Know your limits. And If you know you're a victim, immediately inform police and verify with a SANE (rape specialist) nurse."

High school student, 24 year old male, or mother... It could happen to anyone, including you. It's time for a wakeup call and realization on how serious this is. The victim, in any situation, is never at fault and should never feel that way. You should always call authorities whether you're the victim or know any information about this type of incident. 
expectations sometimes come from what we hear from others. They might tell us,




There are modern interpreta-

IMPLICATIONS OF PSYCHOLOGICAL TRAUMA ON ADOLESCENTS

"...If clinicians fail to look through a trauma lens and to conceptualize client problems as related possibly to current or past trauma, they may fail to see that trauma victims, young and old, organize much of their lives around repetitive patterns of reliving and warding off traumatic memories, reminders, and affects."

-Excerpt from a report prepared for the Vermont Agency of Human Services by Kathleen J. Moroz, DSW, **LICSW**

Trauma is defined by different circumstances, all of which are developed by the physical or psychological threat or assault to a child's physical integrity including their sense of self and the safety of another person that represents any form of significance to the victim. These circumstances may consist of three elements: lack of expectation, unpreparation, and the lack of ability to prevent the event from happening.

Furthermore, it is not specifi-

relationship, a deeply humiliating experience, life-threatening conditions, and other similar situations may all prove traumatizing.

Mr. Clark, the psychology teacher at Landstown High stated that a traumatic event changes the way you see the world and changes the way you see the people around you. He continued that trauma "depends on your environment and it depends on your genetics [...] it's kinda one of those things where each individual is going to have different reactions ultimately depending on how traumatic about things and view the world and view other people."

When asked about his experiences with trauma victims, Mr. Clark replied, "some people will go in a shell, some people will go the other way and they're over the top where they maybe make bad choices... Most kids who've been through em' are reaching out for help and the problem is we all don't recognize that they've been through a traumatic experience. So what happens a lot of times in schools is someone's been through something traumatic and they're acting out; sometimes they get viewed as a delinquent or just not a very good person. But really all it is is them trying to get those feelings out and sometimes they don't come out in such a nice way. Part of that is being able to recognize it in the kids."

Mr. Clark further elaborated on a particular student that he remembers, "... one girl in general who ultimately she's a writer working for the newspaper, and there was a point in her life where she couldn't see the light at the end of the tunnel, she didn't know she was gonna' make it where she thought about things like suicide and ultimately a couple people stepped up and recognized that she was asking for help and it changed her life. She got into college and was able to get some help just talking about some of these issues. Where most of her life people didn't believe what had happened." The fact of it is, if people fail to look through and comprehend that a particular individual's feelings and actions may mean something greater than what is truly shown, they may base their entire life around the event and won't be able to conceptu-

alize an opportunity for a greater life;

possibly taking their own.

Overall, the game is a solid 9/10 and excites players of what will come next in the Assassin's Creed series.


YOU ONLY ENTER ONCE

WHIP IT UP: 5 MINUTE MUG CAKE

If you've been on social media, you've definitely witnessed your fair share of food posts. Your cousin just posted an Instagram photo of her famous chocolate cake, moist and delicious, and before you know it, you're craving something that you can't have. So, how do you beat the cake cravings?

People have been sharing recipes since the beginning of time, but within the last two years, food bloggers have invented and evolved something that seems too good to be true: a five minute cake. A five minute mug recipe is single serving, and is supposed to be easy and quick; and of course, in a mug. I've made a few of them, and it's not all it's cracked up to be. There are some basics you need to know before embarking on a cake quest yourself.

As a clueless cook, I asked a Landstown student what they thought about 5 minute mug recipes. "It's efficient, amazing, and you can make one just for you," says Jill Bangs, senior, who's a cake-mug veteran. "But the first time, it exploded in my microwave." Not wanting to have to clean up a chocolaty mess, I asked her what I could do to avoid a cake-tastrophe. Jill essentially told me to be aware of what mug you're using, as not all mugs are created equal. Also notable advice is not to go too thin, as a skinnier mug can pretty much boil your batter, or create a dense eggy disk at the bottom. Trial and error is pretty common, and you should expect a few hiccups. When looking for an online recipe, remember that not all microwaves are the same, and voltage should be minded as well. With these

tips in mind, on to the recipe.

Chocolate Mug Cake

Originally taken from jbeancuisine. com, but with a few tweaks. Serving: 1 individual sized cake (your mug will be generously full)

Cook Time: 3 – 5 minutes depending upon your microwave Ingredients:

- 4 TBSP flour
- 4 TBSP sugar
- 2 TBSP cocoa powder
- 1 large egg
- 3 TBSP milk
- 3 TBSP vegetable oil
- 1 good-sized mug
- Non-stick Cooking spray.

ginners' recipe, so to spice it up, you can add 1-2 Tablespoons of Nutella or chocolate spread, or as many chocolate chips as your heart desires.

After baking, you can add ice cream, chocolate syrup, or whipped-cream.

This is an extremely basic be-

Before you do anything, spray the inside of the mug with non-stick cooking spray. After measuring out your ingredients, put all of the dry ones in the mug first, then the wet. Mix until it looks like cake batter, of course, and make sure to scrape the bottom and the sides of the mug to get all the dry bits.

Pop the whole thing in your microwave, and cook for 2 ½ to 3 minutes, depending on your microwave. Use an oven mitt when taking it out, it's hot, and that's not a joke; I burnt my hand. Don't be like me.

Voilà, you've got a cake. Add your whipped-cream and chocolate sauce, and enjoy.
