

## Comma Splices & Run-On Sentences 1

A comma splice is a sentence error that results when two independent clauses are joined together with only a comma. A run-on sentence is a sentence error that results when two independent clauses are joined without any punctuation. Both of these errors can be corrected in one of several ways. Turn to page 557 in *Write Source*.

**Place** an **RO** in front of each run-on sentence, a **CS** in front of each comma splice, and a **C** in front of each correct sentence. Correct each faulty sentence. Use the proofreading marks inside the back cover of *Write Source*.

- CS 1. I never really enjoyed science, <sup>(or) M</sup> math is my favorite subject.
- CS 2. By the time we arrived, the show was nearly over, <sup>(or) W</sup> we missed everything but the credits and the cartoon.
- RO 3. Don't touch that chair, <sup>!!</sup> it has just been painted.
- C 4. I got an "A" on my English test. I've never gotten one before.
- CS 5. Some students would rather goof around than study, <sup>(or) S</sup> some adults went through the same thing when they were in school.
- CS 6. Some run-on sentences are easy to recognize, <sup>(or) O</sup> others are much more difficult.
- RO 7. Joan's mother works at the hospital, <sup>(or), and</sup> her father works at the school.
- CS 8. John had to go to his violin lesson, <sup>(or), but</sup> however, he will stop by when he is through.
- C 9. Katrin enjoys shopping for clothes, especially when someone else is paying for them.
- CS 10. Time goes slowly when you are working, <sup>(or), but</sup> it seems to fly when you are playing.
- C 11. Akira will meet us at the skating rink later; he has to go home to pick up his skates.

**Extend:** Write two run-on sentences and two sentences with a comma splice. Exchange papers with a classmate and correct each other's sentence errors.
